Welcome to these web pages, which offer information about 'Caring for Our Common Home', a day conference organised by the Cumbria Theological Society, Churches Together in Cumbria Environment Group and St John's Church, Keswick.

What is the day conference about?

It's a day to reflect on why we should care for the earth, our common home, and the challenges we face in doing so. It's about becoming aware of faith perspectives on the environment and environmental challenges, and to identify practical actions we can take, both as individuals and as communities.

Firstly, a very happy New Year to all our readers. We hope 2019 will have great things in store for you. We have some exciting things coming up during February.

Twelfth Night has gone and our Christmas decorations have been put away for another year, but the liturgical Christmas Season doesn't actually end until Candlemas.

At St Lawrence's we traditionally celebrate Candlemas (sometimes called The Presentation of Christ in the Temple, or even The Feast of the Purification) with a service of Solemn Eucharist. This will take place on Saturday February 2nd at 7.30pm. Bishop James Bell, formerly Bishop of Ripon, will Preside and our own Revd Peter Boyles will Preach. The service will be celebrated in the Anglo-Catholic tradition and a good size choir will assemble to lead the singing.

Reservations of individual places for this always popular occasion can be made at the Tourist Information Centre from Monday 25 February 2019.

Edenside

The Town Council was delighted that the Oaklea Trust has taken further steps on the long road to the restoration of Edenside – now owned by Oaklea - as a care facility in Appleby. There was a good attendance and a positive atmosphere at the Hub on Monday 7 January, when Oaklea's senior officers explained their plans. This is a very big undertaking, but the will to succeed was there for all to see. Anyone interested in knowing more about and/or supporting the venture can collect an information pack from the Hub.

Budgets

Our three councils - Appleby Town, Eden District and Cumbria County - are all in the process of setting their 2019-20 budgets following

consultations with the public. Details will be finalised in February at meetings which are open to the public.

Devolution

Appleby Town Council is disappointed that the process of devolution of various properties and services from Eden District Council has fallen behind schedule. It is hoped that there will be significant progress in the course of 2019.

Could you do something amazing?

Cumbria County Council supports the wonderful work done by over 200 foster families, some in the Appleby area. Fosterers are part of a team, with their own social worker and contact with other carers. With over 600 children needing foster families, more volunteers are always needed There are a number of different schemes:

- Short Term Fostering: children are looked after until family circumstances change to enable them to return home.
- Long Term Fostering: children need a substitute permanent family.
- Approved Support (Respite) Care: children are looked after for short periods, usually weekends or holidays to provide temporary breaks for their carers/families.
- Short Breaks (Shared Care): carers are linked with families who have one or more children with disabilities, to provide regular short-term care.
- Homestays. Families with room to spare supply supported accommodation for young people in work, training or employment who are leaving the care system and learning to live independently.

Volunteers Needed to Support Families with Young Children

Cumbria Family Support (Note new name - as they used to be East Cumbria Family Support) need more volunteers to support families who are going through a difficult patch, and have young or primary age children.

Support might involve looking after a child to enable a parent to attend appointments which benefit the whole family; or focus on building positive relationships by facilitating family activities. Sometimes support may focus on helping parents to build on their strengths, and feel confident about the decisions they make. These are just examples, and each family's needs are individually assessed. To use that well- worn phrase – 'we do what it says on the tin'- we support families.

Our volunteers come from all walks of life, and are of all ages and experience. They respect family confidentiality, are non-judgemental and have been at the heart of our organisation since we began 24 years ago. Full training and ongoing support is given, and travel expenses paid. Bus Talk

563 Appleby - Penrith Bus Service

The 563 bus service has been included in the current Stagecoach Lakes Connection Guide timetable which operates until 5 April (2019). New users, as well as current users, continue to be welcome on the 563 to help secure and possibly further develop the service, as we do need passenger numbers to continue to increase. The 563 service consists of 3 return Penrith - Appleby journeys, between 9.15 to 15.00, Monday to Friday, calling at Kirkby Thore and Temple Sowerby and runs all year including school holidays. The first service to Penrith, leaving Appleby Moot Hall at 9.50 and the final service leaving Penrith Rail Station at 13.30 and the Bus Station at 13.40 for Appleby include a loop via Cross Croft and Drawbriggs Lane. Bus stops have been installed on Bongate (near end of St Michaels Lane), on Cross Croft (near entrance to Orchard Place) and next to Moot Hall. Where there isn't a bus stop, the bus will stop to let you on if you hail the driver and also drop you off if you request this (although this is at the discretion of the driver for safety reasons). The same two services go into Sandersons Croft in Kirkby Thore.

506 Appleby - Penrith - Kendal Bus Service

The 506 service, also operated by Stagecoach, runs during Kendal College term times Monday to Friday, leaving Appleby Moot Hall (outward) at 6.55 and leaving Penrith bus station (return) at 18.32.

Tickets are interchangeable between the 563 and 506 services. Leaflets containing details of the 563 and 506 services are available at the Appleby TIC (in Moot Hall) and on online on the Stagecoach website and www.cumbria.gov.uk/buses/eden

OTHER BUS SERVICES

574 Kirkby Stephen - Penrith Bus Service



Partner Agency Messages - Scam Warning

Winter home improvement advice

- Trading Standards advice be sure you choose a trader with care
- If you are planning winter repairs it is understandable you want the
 repairs or installation completed as quickly as possible, but make
 sure in all the haste you don't end up with a rogue trader or poor
 quality repairs. Here is some advice to help you get the right trader
 and smooth repairs.
- NEVER use cold callers who arrive at your property offering to undertake work:
- Rogue Traders may use bad weather events as an opportunity to try to get householders to agree to them undertaking repairs. These rogue traders rarely give householders proper contact details or their legal rights to cancel within 14 days. They may also claim more work is required than actually is to increase their profits and the work they do can often be of poor quality. It is a criminal offence not to receive cancellation rights, if the contract is agreed at your home or place of work. If you feel under threat to agree to the work or the trader starts without your permission immediately call 101.
- Get at least three quotes for the work more if it's a major project
- Look at a trader's previous work. While online reviews can build a
 picture, they can be skewed. A good trader should be able to
 provide a list of former customers you can speak to.
- Note availability good tradespeople are less likely to be free at a moment's notice. Rogue traders will have a story such as 'we were working in the next street and noticed some of your roof tiles are loose'.
- Look for trader registered with accredited trade bodies, and an ADR (Alternative Dispute Resolution scheme). Check affiliations and certificates too. Gas boiler repairs and maintenance should only be carried out with Gas Safe registered engineers.
- Use Companies House to check how long they've been trading – the longer the better - and whether they are financially healthy.
- Get everything in writing. It's a lot easier to untangle problems if you have a solid paper trail. Include details of the work to be carried out, materials needed, the timings and the cost. If this is an estimate, ask what could increase this and by how much.
- NEVER pay the full price upfront Pay by card if there is a problem, there are extra protections, either with your credit card company (if the work costs £100 - £30,000), or a chargeback scheme, which applies to debit and credit card transactions of any value.
- For large-scale jobs, get a full contract. Joint Contracts Tribunal (JCT) building contracts are regulated and recognised within the industry. If you sign a contract in your home, you are entitled to 14 day cancellation.
- What to do if the work is unsatisfactory
- You may well be able to get the trader to redo the job to a satisfactory standard. Explain the problem to the trader and how they can resolve it, with a realistic timescale.
- Record details of your conversations, including when you talk face-to-face or on the phone. But don't discuss your dispute in text or Whatsapp message – you must have emails or letter to have redress
- While withholding money can be effective, we recommend you consult a solicitor for advice – it may put you in breach of contract. The trader could take legal action against you, and you'd be in a weaker position if you go to court.
- If you want someone else to put the work right, you should give the
 original trader reasonable time to fix the issue, otherwise you may
 not be able to claim any money back.
- Consider using an ADR scheme, such as an ombudsman. Traders are legally obliged to point you in the direction of one, even if they're not signed up or refuse to use one. If your trader is a member of a trade association, it should be able to offer a service or refer you to one.
- If you're not sure what to do, or whether you should report the matter to Trading Standards, Action Fraud or the police contact the Citizens Advice consumer helpline on 0345 404 0506. It can also signpost you to a relevant ADR scheme.

If you want to receive information but do not wish to be responsible for a larger group, you are still welcome to make use of this messaging system.

As well as Cumbria Constabulary the partners providing information are Cumbria County Council, Cumbria Fire and Rescue Service, Environment agency and Cumbria Neighbourhood Watch Association. If you do not have internet access, contact your local PCSO and they will aid in registering your details on the system.

The Need to Feed a Nation

As a retired teacher of history and geography, Richard Preston brought his continuing urge to enlighten and inform to the Appleby-in-Westmorland Society in their usual venue of the Public Hall Supper Room

In the 100th anniversary year of the ending of World War One, he began by telling how the evolution from pocket to wristwatches was hastened by the greater practicality of the latter on the battlefield.

Moving on to his main theme, the problem of feeding the nation during wartime, he emphasised the need during those years for the country to become more self-sufficient and less reliant on imports, made difficult as these were by the German introduction of submarines as weapons of war to intercept Allied merchant shipping. Farmers responded to the government call to produce more, although this was hampered by the requirement for horses for the battlefield competing with their being needed as a staple of arable farming. A local man, Fred Armstrong, went to Canada and brought back 5,000 horses to the UK to partly alleviate the Army's requisitioning of some of the country's 125,000 horses for military purposes. The Great War was initially the war of the volunteer soldier, but with some farming families divided over whether their sons should stay to work the land instead of heeding the call to fight for King and country.

From 1916 farmers were required to sell their hay to the government. In the interests of limiting profiteering (was 'black market' only a World War Two phrase?); the Defence of the Realm Act and the Corn Production Act followed in 1917 and 1918. Farmers had wanted their sons to be allowed to leave school early to work on the land, but that problem had

been partly offset by POWs being allowed to do that task. This was popular with the captive Germans and others, as they were paid a modest sum and life on the land was preferable to the boredom and limitations of prison life. Tractors were introduced, initially from America, the Mogul and the Ford Model F being forerunners. Government intervention was ever-present, such was the need to feed the home population, with bad farmers being moved off their farms From 1917 onwards allotments were introduced, with the railways companies donating land for the purpose. Land Girls were a formal organisation, with village women generally working on he fields while their menfolk were away at war. Timber, for wooden huts to duckboards to traverse the mud of the battlefields, was another drain on the nation's resources, with the Beacon being cut down in 1918 and replanting taking place there and on land near what is now Center Parcs.

The year after the Great War ended, the Forestry Commission was created, but in other ways the government didn't learn from the conflict. Agricultural subsidies which might have speeded postwar recovery were quickly withdrawn. Yet, when a few decades later it proved not to have been 'the war to end all wars' rationing was introduced in 1939 and with conscription not volunteers, agricultural controls were quickly put in place.

Chairman Chris Wilson gave the vote of thanks to Mr Preston and wished members the compliments of the season.





2nd February - The Presentation of Christ in the Temple/ Candlemas

In bygone centuries, Christians said their last farewells to the Christmas season on Candlemas, 2 February. This is exactly 40 days after Christmas Day itself.



iln New Testament times 40 days old was an important age for a baby boy: it was when they made their first public appearance'. Mary, like all good Jewish mothers, went to the Temple with Jesus, her first male child - to present Him to the Lord'. At the same time, she, as a new mother, was 'purified'. Thus, we have the Festival of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple.

So where does the Candlemas bit come in? Jesus is described in the New Testament as the Light of the World, and early Christians developed the tradition of lighting many candles in celebration of this day. The Church also fell into the custom of blessing the year's supply of candles for the church on this day - hence the iname, Candlemas.

The story of how Candlemas began can be found in Luke! 2:22-40. Simeon's great declaration of faith and recognition of who Jesus was is of course found in the Nunc Dimittis, which is embedded in the Office of Evening Prayer in the West. But in medieval times, the Nunc Dimittis was mostly used just on this day, during the distribution of candles before the Eucharist. Only gradually did it win a place in the daily prayer life of the Church.



We have just returned from our annual parish three-day silent retreat at St Epiphanius' Priory.



It can come as quite a shock for first-timers: the ladies are appalled to discover that there is neither coffee shop nor hairdressers, and the men that there is no bar or billiards table. The resident community certainly frowned on the four men among us who were discovered silently pushing a car down the drive late one evening before starting it at the main gates as they escaped to the nearest pub. Those of us who are older hands know to bring our own supplies - carefully wrapped, so that the clinking of bottles is not too obvious as one ascends the main staircase. The near universal retreat to bedrooms before dinner is less an opportunity for quiet reflection and more one for a restorative

And so we return, knowing that we have done our bit once again for the spiritual vigour of the parish, and also that three days of vegetarian cooking will mean a long queue at the village butchers tomorrow morning.

Lead Bishop for Education calls on Government for Rural Strategy



The Church of England's lead bishop for Education, the Rt Revd Stephen Conway, Bishop of Ely, has called for a cross-Government rural strategy to safeguard the future of education in rural communities.

Bishop Stephen said that while 'We have been reassured that the Government has a presumption against the closure of rural schools,' and also that 'a number of stakeholder organisations, as well as those who are working with schools and communities, are exploring innovations in collaboration,' yet still 'an overarching rural strategy is now required for the issues facing our countryside communities.' The Bishop said: 'Over the past 200 years Church of England schools have adapted to significant changes in society... We are committed to working with the Government to achieve this.'

All the lonely people

Where do they all come from? All the lonely people Where do they all belong?

The Beatles saw loneliness all around them back in the 60s, when they wrote the lyrics to *Eleanor Rigby*. And loneliness is growing: the number of lonely over-50s will hit two million within seven years, according to recent data from the English Longitudinal Study of Ageing.

The study points out that older people often live alone, lack someone to confide in, or are widowed, or are in poor health, or are unable to do the things they want, or feel that they do not belong in their neighbourhood

Caroline Adams, Age UK's charity director warns that such loneliness will bring 'serious consequences for their physical and mental health, and therefore for the NHS, unless we take action now.' But action will be a challenge, for the adult social care sector is badly over-stretched, with up to 110,000 jobs vacant across the country.

QWERTY celebrates a big birthday

The inventor of the QWERTY keyboard – now almost universally adopted in English-speaking countries – was born 200 years ago, on 14th February 1819, in Pennsylvania. Christopher Latham Scholes was an Episcopalian who could trace his ancestry back to two of the original Mayflower pilgrims, John and Priscilla Alden.

Although he did not invent the typewriter from scratch, Scholes was instrumental in developing a successful working model. Vital to this was his changing the keyboard, which was originally in alphabetical order but had a tendency to jam. Scholes rearranged the levers so that frequently used keys would not interfere with each other.

Scholes started out as a printer and then, after moving to Wisconsin, became a newspaper publisher. He served two terms as a Senator for Wisconsin, one as a Democrat and one as a Republican.

His typewriter was not a commercial success until he joined forces with the Remington company, selling them half his rights for \$12,000. In 1878 he added a shift key so that the writer could switch easily between capitals and lower-case letters. He died in 1890, probably of tuberculosis.

'The Presentation in the Temple' by Guercino

This month of February opens with the celebration of Candlemas. On the 2nd we recall that special moment of enlightenment when Mary and Joseph bring Jesus to the temple. They meet Simeon, who represents the waiting people of Israel – a nation looking for a better world now that the holy city was in the hands of Roman invaders.



Simeon clung to the hope that God would come to bring freedom and a new life. When it came, there was no fanfare, no warning. St Luke in his Gospel tells us of an ordinary family from faraway Nazareth who go to Jerusalem to perform the religious duties for the firstborn son. But in their encounter with Simeon we see and hear something extraordinary.

The scene is captured in this beautiful painting of 1623 that hangs in the National Gallery: 'The Presentation in the Temple' by Guercino. The artist Giovanni Barbieri had the curious nickname Guercino which means 'Squinty.' Why squinty, we are not sure, for all is clear and lyrical in this work.

At the base of the canvas we see the turtle doves with two ducks, but the heart of the scene focuses on Mary, Joseph and Simeon linked by the Christ-Child. Notice the gentle hands of Mary, the strong, supportive hands of Joseph, and the outstretched, waiting hands of Simeon. He may be an old man, but he is ready to welcome the babe, who is offered as a sign of hope and light for the future. A candle burns at the right side to emphasise the light shed by this meeting of infancy and old age.

St Luke by tradition was an artist himself, depicting the stories of his gospel with the deft strokes of a painter. In this scene the words of the evangelist and the skill of a 17th century Italian artist tell us that, at whatever age we are, we can also find light and hope as we offer our hands and our hearts to welcome the Christ-Child.

David Pickup, a solicitor, offers some advice on how to deal with personal debt.

Plan your way out of personal debt

'... making a way in the wilderness and streams in the wasteland.' (Isaiah 43:19)

The bills left over from Christmas are still coming through your letterbox with a thud. You can recognise which are bills before you open them, and your heart sinks. Many people have debts which they struggle with and which they cannot control. Such debts can lead to relationship problems and ill health, and in time, ruin your whole life. Meanwhile, it is very tempting to leave the post unopened. But then the phone calls start, and soon some of your debtors are threatening you. Here are some suggestions to cope with this.

Be honest with yourself and those closest to you.

Do not borrow more to pay off debts, because you end up in a spiral of debt.

Check if you are being hounded for debts that are not yours, or are over six years old.

Are you being unfairly treated? It is illegal to harass anyone in debt. That could include persistent telephone calls or turning up at your house.

Make a budget. Prioritise - sort out essentials. Get advice about increasing your income and cutting expenditure.

Manage family expectations. There is often pressure on you to spend too much on holidays, Christmas and birthdays.

Start a savings plan with a credit union, even if it is just a pound a week

You can get help from money and other advice agencies. **Christians Against Poverty** (CAP) is a Christian organisation which does very good work.

As always this is a light-hearted guide to a serious subject. Get proper advice, as soon as you can!

Do you have spare room in your home?

Could you offer temporary shelter to a victim of human trafficking?

Helen and Jared Hodgson have started the only charity in the UK which provides a home to the victims of human trafficking, and they are seeking churchgoers across the UK who will help, by providing temporary accommodation. So far, the Hodgson's *Hope at Home* charity has about 14 host families, but they estimate that they need 1000 such welcoming, safe homes.

Hope at Home began when Helen and Jared went to India and worked with street children. There they met girls who had been trafficked into the sex industry. The horrors they heard about shocked and moved them, so that when they returned home they moved to a bigger house, in order to set up Hope at Home, and have spare rooms to offer.

The need for UK safe homes is huge. At any one time the Global Slavery index estimate that about 136,000 people are being trafficked in the UK alone. People are trapped in the sex industry, domestic servitude, working in nail bars, agriculture and car washes, to name but a few.

Some 5145 victims were rescued in the UK by the police and other agencies last year. But once they have left the temporary safe house that they are initially sent to, many survivors face destitution and are vulnerable to being re-trafficked.

One victim whom the Hodgsons took in, Sarah (not real name) stayed with them for a year. She says: 'They made me feel very comfortable. They tell me they love me — I've never heard this before in my whole life. Now I can do things I was scared to do before: I can go out, and I don't lock myself away. I had tried to kill myself before, because I was so lonely. The charity is looking for host families especially in Sheffield, Bristol, and the West Midlands, where it has strong relationships with partner agencies who can support survivors and host families.

Helen Hodgson stresses that it is crucial that the local church supports any host family who takes on the challenge, by both prayer and giving time to befriend the recovering victim, and share with them the love of God.






